The term 'narrative' refers to historical narrative, primarily in this case, to Old Testament historical narrative.

Narrative Typology and the Deity of Christ

The term 'typology' refers to the literary and theological device where an Old Testament person, object, or event foreshadows a later person, object, or event such that the latter is a fulfillment of the former.

 - a. Israel camped before the mountain. v. 2
 - b. God was on the mountain.
 - (1) Cf. Ex. 3:1 Now Moses was tending the flock of Jethro his father-in-law, the priest of Midian. And he led the flock to the back of the desert, and came to Horeb, the mountain of God. (Horeb = Mt. Sinai)
 - (2) Cf. also Ex. 33:6 w/ 34:1-2

 - c. Moses went up the mountain to God. v. 3
 - d. Moses had to convey to the people the words of God. (vv. 3-7)

 - c. This is a deliberate inverse of Mt. Sinai in that now, because of what Jesus will do, there is no more separation between God and man.
 - b. Jesus gives the beatitudes (cf. the Law).
 - c. Jesus tells the disciples "Be perfect, just as your Father in Heaven is perfect." (Matt. 5:48)
