"The lack of higher education can translate into more tangible problems for Witnesses. Pew research shows that Jehovah's Witnesses are among the lowest earners of any religious group,"

Mormons also maintain an extensive missionary program with 83,035 missionaries and 406 missions worldwide. Mormons serve on a voluntary basis.

Further:

There are over 279 million Pentecostals worldwide, and the movement is growing in many parts of the world, especially the global South. Since the 1960s, Pentecostalism has increasingly gained acceptance from other Christian traditions, and Pentecostal beliefs concerning Spirit baptism and spiritual gifts have been embraced by non-Pentecostal Christians in Protestant and Catholic churches through the Charismatic Movement. Together, Pentecostal and Charismatic Christianity numbers over 500 million adherents. This means that, according to this analysis, Pentecostal and charismatic Christians together, make up about 27% of all Christians and more than 8% of the world's total population.

Further:

There are an estimated 1.2 billion Roman Catholics in the world, according to Vatican figures. More than 40% of the world's Catholics live in Latin America - but Africa has seen the biggest growth in Catholic congregations in recent years. Figures released in 2008 estimated 271,602 physical churches. However, that number probably does not include mission churches, independent churches, and many other orders. So Kilroy may wish to re-think his numbers game.
