JW does not believe that we are saved by grace through Christ. They believe they will be saved by their membership in the Watchtower Bible and Tract Society and their good works. They teach the antithesis of the true gospel of Jesus Christ. This means they are not a Christian organization but a cult. In fact, they satisfy all the main requirements of a cult such as controlling their members through fear, isolating them from their families, forbidding them from reading other doctrinal materials other than what the Watchtower Society publishes, questioning the doctrines and anything said or done by the Society or the Elders, use members as slave laborers to propagate their rhetoric, separation from society, etc. Essentially this is WITCHCRAFT because witchcraft is all about control! Yes, that makes the JW an occultic group. Wanna see a JW run? Show them a cross and they run away. They are terrified of crosses and religious ornaments and relics. Why? It's because they possess the spirit of the anti-christ!
