The 8 Most Shocking Realizations From A Fader

JW / Ex-JW Tales

I'm about a month away from fully completing my fade and I've been living as if I were "worldly" for sometime now, though I still try and follow Christian standards (which are MUCH different than borg standards). Like many of you, I quickly realized the world is so much more relaxed and humble than any congregation I've been in. These are 8 things that have really shocked me about "the world".

1. "Worldly People" Are MUCH, MUCH Nicer Than Most JW's

I was always told like many of you that people in the world are "just out for themselves" and they're extremely psychotic, satanic and deceitful. The truth is, those types of people will be found in any group you look at. But on average, I've seen the opposite to be true.

"Worldly people" actually have empathy unlike JW's. There's no "well you should've done this better" or "focus only on the positive aspects of life" no no no. Normal people acknowledge life can sometimes suck and people need time to process and move on from things. I've felt way better and supported listening to complete stranger's advice then any elder's advice I've been given.

2. Jehovah's Witnesses Are Some Of The Most Awkward People On The Planet...

I had no idea just how awkward I was being around strangers when I was PIMI. As a JW, I was taught to push anyone who isn't "in the truth" away and avoid even a superficial relationship of any kind with them. Even when I'd open up, it would be about controversial religious topics and as you could imagine, that's a little too intense for 99% of people you'll meet.

But I know I'm not alone in this. Have you ever felt awkward and aimless in public for no reason? Did you ever struggle to simply acknowledge a classmate or coworker as an actual person so as to avoid a conversation with them? Has there been times where you made friends outside the organization but quickly drew yourself away so as to not have "bad association" in your life? I'm guilty of all 3 of those things. The worst part? That's considered normal in the organization.

3. Personal Beliefs Are (Usually) Deeply Respected

From my experience in the ministry, I just thought that everyone rude to me at the door was clearly going through something or were just straight up clowns for not even giving me the light of day. This led me to believe that we should always keep our opinions silent unless we are to preach. But...

On any other topic it's not the case. Why? People are much nicer when we don't enter into their yards and wake them up at 9am on a Saturday morning. I live in a very liberal state and despite being a libertarian who leans more to the conservative party, everyone has been extremely respectful debating with me, even if they strongly disagree. This goes beyond politics too. It's just such a contrast to how heated religious arguments would get. The ugliest conversations I've ever had were at the door trying to debate a trinitarian or atheist. But even worse was having disagreements with other JW's...

Do you disagree with the governing body or an elder? That calls for immediately being called into the back room and "counseled" for simply having a different opinion. They will shame you into oblivion until you feel like such a piece of shit you don't even feel like you can make decisions for yourself.

4. "Apostates" Can Be Very Kind People

I've talked to several apostates recently both in-person and online and they're not at all what the organization claims them to be. They're usually just deeply hurt individuals who got dealt a bad hand and just wants to make sure that nobody else every falls victim to the mental oppression of the borg. Now, there are some very hateful and bitter apostates too and they seem to be a vocal minority which gives the rest a bad name. But I'm sure they're the most hurt ones.

5. Judgemental People Are Rare Outside The Borg

This probably took me by the most suprise for whatever reason. The constant "keeping our brothers and sisters in line" BS we all got at one time or another led me to believe that if these were God's people who are so loving, then people in the world must be much worse. And I realized quickly that I was mistaken.

You have beard? Who cares. You have a skirt that's above the knees? Who cares. You wear ripped jeans? Who cares. You do more than just missionary sex in the bedroom? Who cares. You believe in God, are agnostic or atheist? Who cares. You celebrate Christmas? Who cares.

It's so mentally liberating I can not put it into words.

6. Nobody Good Sexualizes Teenagers

After stepping back, I now find it incredibly weird and disturbing just how much teenagers were sexualized in the organization. Once a girl starts developing breasts, all of a sudden all the sisters will tell her exactly how to dress so it's "modest". My wife said around 12-13, she'd constantly get sisters checking her boobs out and tell her to wear higher collars so as to not show cleavage. She also said quite a few elders in her congregation told her parents that "she's going to cause alot of trouble for brothers" which is just...ew. There's a minimum 30-year age gap between her and an elder.

Then on the brother's side, the elders are obsessed with whether you masturbate or watch pornography. Every single conversation I would have with an elder when I was 14-17 was about just that. I was always told that if I masturbate it would "make me gay" and after tens of thousands of meat-beatings later, I'm still as straight as an arrow. Probably TMI, my bad lol. But why in the world are teens so sexualized in the organization?

Try any of what I just listed in the world and see how long it takes to be put on a certain registry...

7. My Actions Aren't Always Under A Microscope

I remember the first time I let a curse word slip put of my mouth, my heart sank. I thought I was going to have to tell the elders and break down in tears to maybe, just hopefully attain Jehovah's forgiveness. I was never so fearful in my life. Now looking back at that, it's a funny story. But at the time, I thought I just spoke my way out of paradise.

In the world though, it couldn't be more opposite. Most of the time it's actually hard to trigger someone the same way you can trigger a JW. The difference I've seen is in the world judgemental people are hated, but in the borg they're idolized.

8. Nobody Cares That You're An EX-JW

I thought I had the most interesting story ever because I escaped a cult (or at the very least a high-controm group) but uh, nobody who's not an exjw themselves really seems to care. I think I feel victim to the idea often preached by the GB that the religion is so unique and whatnot that I subconsciously believed it myself. Back to number 2 if you want to see how that went.

I'd have to say that of all the items you listed, the last one resonated with me the most.



I remember a point in a KM article. It must have been either '89, '90, or '91. I say that because I know where I was at the time it was covered at a midweek meeting, and I was only in that area during those years. The article stated in a serious manner that JWs had enemies behind the scenes plotting against them. The wording made me think that the Great Leaders knew something they couldn't tell us and that we were really special on the world scene and that there were powerful entities plotting against us. I believed it at the time, but I gradually awakened and I now view it as a load of BS. Most of the world didn't give a damn about some puny religion whose theology was largely based on the delusional writings of a socially awkward old man who wore flannel shirts and talked to his shoes.

So much for the "preaching work"

I've said that often. JWs think that one of the major signs that they are the one and only true religion is that they fulfill Mt 24:14. The preaching work is lame and always has been. Even back in the 80s, etc. when the org was stronger, the preaching work was lame. They might have even viewed it negatively (nobody told me that, though).





I, being POMO for over 15 years, really appreciate your thread and points enumerated. Especially #s 1, 4, and 8.

I have encountered a moderate number of NIs who, regardless of their knowledge that a person is a dub or exdub, will treat people according to how they personally feel about the person (if they like the person, they will show respect; don't like the individual; disrespect is shown).

The same concerning the former dubs: Not all are for each other. Some have reverted back to whatever points of view they had before conversion and some have developed certain viewpoints as time when on due to their experience in the Borg and the people they associate with. For example, a few of my now exdub relatives and I went to a meet-up a few years and were introduced to a group of exdubs by the hosts. After the initial pleasantries, two of the exdubs' facial expressions automatically changed from smiles to frowns, and these two walked away quickly, mumbling some insults. We later mentioned to our hosts about that; they told us that these two "were not happy to see that there were P.O.C.s at this event" and "felt uncomfortable being there".

The people who are nonrelatives (NIs) don't care about a person's belief system (former or present)--as long as they show respect/human decency/honesty towards them and others, there was no big deal made. WT makes a GIGANTIC DEAL out of everything!
